

"Going to a Moot is like going on a strange family holiday to Iceland where your family (patrol) is made up of 10 people from multiple nationalities and you stay with 3 other families of 10 to make up a tribe. I say family because, over the course of the

Moot, you become very close with your patrol as you live, cook, eat and do activities together, as well as organising yourselves and helping each other out.

During the Moot, we had the opportunity to go and sightsee around Rekyjvick (the capital), travel around up to Akureyri (our activity centre) and Úlfljótsvatn (the main campsite). Throughout all of these places we were able to go hiking up mountains, visit hot pools and the naturally heated swimming pools, carry out community work at a farm, visit geysers, craters and geothermal power plants. In addition there were endless amounts of games and smaller activities for us to get involved in at the campsites.

During our stay at the main campsite in Úlfljótsvatn we took part in the international day, where we got to experience the cultures and traditions of different countries. Every country at the Moot had their own stall with food, games, information and art etc. The group of us from London had decided to dress up as tube stations and make it a challenge for people to go around and get a photo with 10 tube stations to win a prize.

My experience in Iceland wasn't just limited to the Moot. We wanted to make the most of our time in Iceland, so a couple of us spent a few days before and after Moot doing a couple of road trips along the South and West coasts. In the few days we managed to drive hundreds of kilometres through the beautiful landscapes of Iceland; climb a glacier, walk underneath and see 6 waterfalls including the massive Gullfoss waterfall and visit the continental divide in Pingvellir National Park.

Overall I had a fantastic time in Iceland, got to meet some great people and got a amazing experience or Iceland and the Moot.

I would recommend anyone to go on similar trips as part of the UK Contingent, especially if it is to a great country like Iceland."

## 1st North Cray Scout Group commemorates the centenary of Passchendaele for Founder member

On the 31 August 2017 members of the 1st North cemetery. The Scout Group also took part in the daily Cray Scout Group from Bexley travelled to Ypres Salient to commemorate the centenary of Passchendaele.

Since the Group was reformed in 2015, the young people have been learning about its history and, in particular, the connection of the Scout Group with one of the well-known Bexley families and their son, Geoffrey Vesey Holt, Assistant Scout leader after whom their Scout Hall is named. Geoffrey became 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Horse Artillery. He was posted to the Passchendaele offensive on 27 March 1917. On 2nd September 1917, a solitary shell exploded close to Geoffrey at the 3rd Battle of Ypres and it is unclear whether he was killed outright or taken to a Field Hospital, where he passed away. Geoffrey was 19 years old.

The Scout group visited Bard Cottage on the Ypres Salient to lay a wreath on Geoffrey's grave and keep his memory alive. Their day trip included visiting trenches at Hooge Crater, Hill 60, Caterpillar Crater and Tyne Cot

Menin Gate 'Last Post' ceremony where Austen Coppen and Charlotte Day were invested.

Officially known as the Third Battle of Ypres, Passchendaele became infamous not only for the scale of casualties, but also for the mud. The Battle of Passchendaele was a campaign of the First World War fought by the allies against the German Empire. The battle took place on the western front from July to November 1917 for control of the ridges south and east of the Belgian city of Ypres in West Flanders.

Nicola Coppen, Group Scout Leader at 1st North Cray said "Finding out about Geoffrey when I joined the Group to help revitalise it, I felt I had a mission to ensure our Members never forget the past. This year, I proposed we take the Scout Troop to see the grave of the Assistant Scout Master. We always pay our respects to him at St James' Church at Remembrance and there is no way we would not be remembering Passchendaele in the Centenary year of Geoffrey's death.









Over the summer Bromley Scouts Youth Events Team organised a trip for almost 200 Scouts, Explorer Scouts and their Leaders to Costa da Caparica, just South of Lisbon, Portugal. The week was jam packed from start to finish with more adventurous activities than you can shake a stick at including surfing, stand up paddle boarding, climbing the Cristo Rei (a very large monument), a day trip to Lisbon, water gladiators, paint balling, high ropes, a tour of Benfica stadium and much more!

Great fun was had by all and having a beautiful, sandy beach 100 metres from the campsite - fantastic; to finish the week off we even ordered nearly 2,000 euros worth of food from Pizza Hut!

Cerys Gilboy, an Explorer Scout from the 28th Bromley, had this to say about the trip: "My favourite activity would be the chance I had to surf and paddle board. The surfing instructor was an amazing teacher. He understood that rather than just giving us basic information and tips on how to surf, we would better enjoy and benefit from our sessions if he was more hands on; he taught us the theory behind surfing which had never been explained to me when surfing previously. This then meant I was able to stand up on my board for a bit which I have never been able to achieve before.

One of my favourite memories from the trip, which I have a lot of moments to pick from, is when we took a trip around Portugal's capital, Lisbon. The trip allowed us to explore the city with more freedom as we picked the places we wanted to see, rather than just being dragged to a boring museum with our leader which we wouldn't have found interesting, as well as using local public transport to get there. This refreshing approach gave me a more cultured insight into the cosmopolitan lifestyle of the Portuguese, while we were guests in their beautiful country.

The trip also helped me to overcome my fear of heights. Having many opportunities to face my fears if I wish to is an integral part of Scouting. The trip to the high ropes allowed me to leap off platforms and into nets with the comfort of knowing that I am safe and in control.

The end of our trip came to a close with another wonderful opportunity to watch the sun go down over the sea. This will be one of my favourite memories as I began to say my goodbyes to the people who had made the last few years of my Scouting life possible and is something I will always appreciate."

Tom Norris, Deputy District Commissioner (Youth Events) for Bromley Scouts said – "it was a huge achievement to be able to offer so many young people an international experience. This is a camp that they will hopefully remember for the rest of their lives. It takes a lot of effort from everybody to make such a large trip work, so I just want to take this opportunity to thank you the Youth Events Team, the leaders from the groups and the great bunch of young people that came along. I'm really excited to be working on similar trips in the future"

Bromley Scouts Youth Events Team, along with the support of the Assistant County Commissioner (International), have announced that there will be another large international trip in 4 years so watch this space for details on the next European adventure in 2021!
