



involved in Scouting, will be following a number of key initiatives:

Review and refresh the programme for 14–25 year olds ensuring that programmes are youth-led, relevant and accessible to young people from all backgrounds, with a focus on employability and life skills.

Explore an early years' provision: researching, piloting and evaluating different models to extend Scouting to under 6 year olds.

Inclusivity: continue to ensure that Scouting better reflects the demographics of UK society, with an aim to grow in another 500 areas of deprivation and underrepresentation; on top of the 834 groups established in similar areas in the last 4 years.

Charlotte aged 14, said "I was given the opportunity to meet other Cubs, Scouts and Explorers who were there from all over the UK. We chatted among ourselves about our experiences in Scouting, how much we enjoy it and what skills we have learned. We were split into 4 activity groups to demonstrate the different skills that Scouting helps young people develop. My group ran the pioneering base, where we demonstrated skills

such as knot tying, communication and team work. The other bases showed how to make your own lava lamp, a stress ball and a tippy tap. There were several young people running each base, so we took it in turns to demonstrate the pioneering skills and talk to a variety of MPs and Earls."

Dwayne Fields, Polar explorer and Scout Ambassador, spoke about his childhood in Jamaica, where he was always outdoors and how he then came to England and didn't fit in as he had a different accent and didn't like the food. One of his friends took him to Cubs, which he really enjoyed and afterwards he decided to join. "It was a great day that I really enjoyed, as I learnt lots about other people's Scouting experiences. I feel very privileged to have attended this event and to have met Dwayne Fields and a variety of MPs."

# Daredevil Scout Leaders jump into action at SCOUTFEST

The weekend of 7th and 8th July saw 110 Scout Leaders and Volunteers from across Bromley and Bexley come together to experience everyday adventure. At Downe Scout Activity Centre – near Biggin Hill - the volunteers completed challenges including abseiling, High Ropes, zip wire, archery, backwoods cooking and high all aboard – where up to 4 people climb to the top of one post and stand on the same platform.

The event was hosted by a group of Scout Leaders from Bromley and Bexley aimed at introducing new Scout volunteers to all the fantastic opportunities and life skills that Scouting has to offer.

Following a call out for more adult volunteers in 2017, 38 have signed up in the last 12 months. These new adults have supported the growth of 58 new youth members in GLSE with a total of 1,659 adults and 5,238 young people enjoying adventure and learning valuable skills for life in Bromley and Bexley.

With the nature of volunteering in the UK changing and more adults offering their time flexibly, more people are needed to run Scouting than ever before. This

includes youth workers, as well as charity trustees and skills instructors.

Scouting across the UK has recorded its 13th consecutive year of growth with 10,699 new youth members and 9,371 adult volunteers joining in 2018, growing the Movement to 638,827 members in the UK. This is the longest period of sustained growth the Movement has experienced since 1930.

The event was also supported by other organisations and businesses including Joe's Bows, Bromley Mytime, Bromley Scuba Diving, Chateau Du Baffy, D & L Knotting, Golden Hinde, JEKA, Making Medics, Metro Bank, Search and Rescue Dog Display, SAC and Timu Rafiki.

Scouts from the 8th West Wickham Group were camping at Caddihoe Scout Campsite in the Ashclyst Forest, and headed to the seaside for a day visit where the 27 Scouts spent 45 minutes picking up all the litter that was lying on a small section of Sidmouth beach, ranging from bottles to polystyrene.

The Scouts met up with Sidmouth Plastic Warriors, a Sidmouth based organisation that also works with other Sidmouth and organisations. The Chair of the Sidmouth Plastic Warriors, Denise Bickley, talked with the Scouts first, she explained how she was encouraged

to do something positive about plastic pollution after seeing the amount of rubbish in the sea when on holiday abroad. She set up the Sidmouth Plastic Warriors to take direct action in her home town and to encourage others to do the same.

Erin Harrington, 13, from the 8th West Wickham Scout, said "We were doing the beach clean so that we could help the environment and inspire other towns and cities to become plastic free and environmentally friendly. I was surprised how much plastic pollution we found and this must change. People should not leave rubbish on the beach as it can be a danger to animals and their habitats, and it also drives tourists away."



Scout leader Stuart Haydon, from 8th West Wickham, said "We always try to do some sort of service project when we camp and this year, as we were taking advantage of what Sidmouth has to offer, we felt it was only right that our service project should be Sidmouth related. The Scouts collected plastic bottles, plastic bottle tops, energy drink cans, plastic bags and sweet wrappers. I have never seen such enthusiasm from the scouts to make a positive impact on our environment. I am very proud of each one of them, and had to actually stop them working so they had time for a swim!"









We got the opportunity to travel all around the country alongside scouts of all various nationalities (there were over 50 countries from around the world attending the event!) we all learnt so much about different cultures and the organisers actively encouraged us to share our views with each other, meaning we all left having learnt something new about each other whether that be a new song, a new meal idea or just that other countries suffer with hot weather too!!



The theme for the event was "opposites attract" focusing mainly on the relationship the Netherlands has with the land and sea. We slept under the stars on the beach at The Hague and under sea level at Zeewolde, took a swim in the canals in the city of Deventer and went gondaling down the canals in Geithorn. We all travelled as a path made up of various different nationalities as this time together allowed us to grow close together.

The trip was an adventure of a lifetime and was amazing for developing both leadership and teamwork skills - the fun I had and friends I made will stay with me for life.

The Scouts took with them 33 bags filled with 23kg of donations of school shoes, clothing, towels, footballs, stationery and hand tools which the group organised to be donated locally. In total that's more than 700kg of donations.



The Scouts from Bromley worked with a charity called Harambee for Kenya. The charity takes in young boys who are homeless off the street and gives them a better life including a safe place to stay, access to education and friendships. Whilst at the safe house in Kissi the scouts took part in project work including art classes, organising a traditional British sports day for the Kenyan boys and helping with some general maintenance around the safe house.

Matthew Higginbottom, 15, from the 23rd Bromley Scout Explorers said: "I have learnt so much with so many new experiences which will stay with me for the rest of my life. I also found the boys at the safe house very inspirational as they had no family or possessions but they were always cheerful. Over the week at the safe house, we were very busy with building a barbecue, entrance steps and painting the walls in the house, this was all part of the project work for the safe house. The expedition to Kenya was an amazing and life changing experience for me."

Alan Alexander, one of the expedition leaders, said: "Scouting has given me opportunities that I can't get anywhere else. It is great to be able to give scouts the opportunity to travel to another continent, experience a different culture and also give something to those who are less fortunate. The scouts have put a lot of work into preparing for the expedition over the last 18 months, including lots of fundraising and it's great to see all the hard work finally paying off. This expedition has made a huge impact on not only the local children but also on our Scouts."





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### Jamboree on the Internet (JOTI) 2018



JOTA-JOTI is the largest Scouting event in the world with over 1 million scouts participating across 150+ countries. The event allows scouts and guides across the world connect with each other using the airwaves and the internet.



Unfortunately we have found it necessary as a County to withdraw from the Jack Petchey Achievement Scheme for the forthcoming year - apologies to those who have already submitted nominations.

Hopefully this will only be a temporary situation; there will be consultation with both Districts. Any feedback about the scheme to date would be useful to help with the consultation and decision process.

The decision was not taken lightly as between the two Districts the Jack Petchey Foundation has awarded over £175,000 to young people and leaders during the eight years we have been involved in the scheme. A lot of activities have taken place, equipment purchased and improvements to meeting places that would not have happened but for the scheme.

Recognition of the achievements of our young people and leaders is very important. The Jack Petchey

Achievement Award Scheme is just one way of doing just that.

We will be able to return to the scheme if that is what you, the leaders, want. You need to help the District Coordinator by submitting nominations and all other relevant information requested in good time.

#### Who are we?

The District Youth Team is in place to ensure that the opinions of Young People are heard and help shape how we as a District run things. We are open to any member of the Scouting Association under the age of 25, at time of application, who wants to voice their opinion in Scouting and gain valuable Skills for Life, in the form of reasoning, debating, taking on leadership, organising and making changes in the way we view and do Scouting.

#### What we do

The Youth Team supports the District aspiration to be part of a Movement led by young people. Providing a voice for around **4,000** young people within Bromley at an influential level, including at the District Executive Committees. Taking responsibility for special projects or activities as requested by the District Commissioner, such as Local Voice, and SCOUTFEST. We provide active support for, and involvement in, the media and public relations work in Bromley. Help develop and mentor your Young Leaders and championing them and their ideas within your group.

#### **Bromley District Youth Forums**

Our District Youth Forums will now also be open to **Scouts** aged **12+** as well as Explorers. This will allow PLs & APLs to begin to share their opinions and develop a voice as they progress through their Scouting career. We will be meeting once every half a term, and changing our Meeting days and times, to allow for weekly commitments of participants.

To help the forum to continue to develop we are seeking **2** additional representatives aged between 12–18 years old) from each group in Bromley to attend. The Forum provides a voice for all young people within Bromley at an influential level, including at the District Executive Committee.

#### 17-30 in Scouting?

We work alongside the District Young Leader team, the DESC and the Explorer Leaders to encourage Young People to join a Network within the district or to continue in Scouting should they go to university by helping them contact a local Network or SSAGO. Help develop the 18-30 year olds in the District and encourage them to take on responsibility within the District whether it be helping out the Youth Event Team, taking on a leadership role or taking part in a Executive or Subcommittee meetings.
