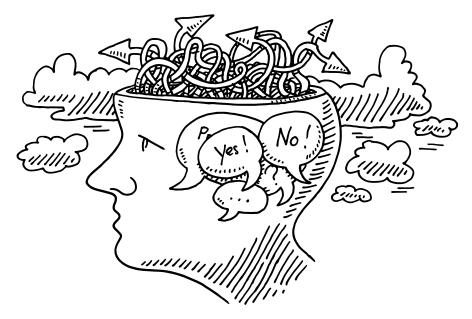


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## Your Autumn edition of i.SHARE

I read subtext into requests that are made of me, I find myself thinking what is the desired response? I catastrophise and more.

Who can relate to this?

You are not alone in this. We all do it. We could think about things from being from the heart or the head.

The head, often, will cause us to over think! I'll share some examples with you: just being asked to pen something for this post - what am I going to say? How will it be received? What do I want to say?

I want to say loads to you because you are all amazing but that doesn't quieten my over thinking brain. How can I work around that? What does my heart say?

The other example was being asked for a colleague for 5 words that described them so that they could update their CV. My overthinking brain kicked in! What would they like me to say? What if I say the wrong things? Sometimes we need to just scale everything back. Don't over think, go with what our hearts say. It's almost an automatic response. The first things that come into your mind.

I'm sure over the last 7 months or so we've all been guilty of overthinking things: you know what? That's normal. How will this







Zoom meeting be received? Will my young people like it? What if I do it wrong? How can I support my members to get the most out of it? What happens if...? We try to prepare for scenarios that we cannot even know about. That is exhausting.

When we overthink things it stops us from being our authentic self. This is who we are, our very being. Why we do what we do. When someone asks you why you do Scouting, is your automatic response "because I love to see young people grow and develop and gain skills for life?" Or is it "because I enjoy it"? Head says one thing, heart the other. What is truly authentic?

Authentic is being brave enough to go off script. Be passionate about what you do. Your enthusiasm will shine through. It's infectious. Overthinking sucks. My message to you is be you!! Be who you are. Turn up and be authentic (virtually or physically). You. You will make a difference. For that, I thank you. From the bottom of my heart I thank you for everything that you have been doing over the last 7 months. There are no more words.

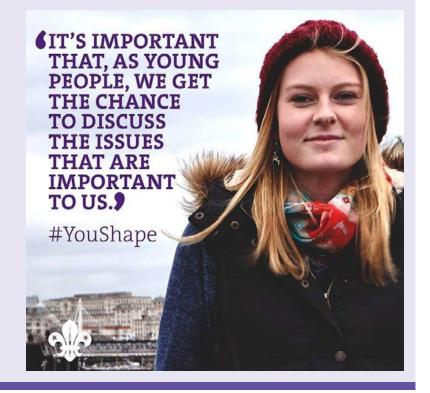

# Scouts from across the County joined celebrity-led digital Scout summer camp

Over the weekend of the 11th–12th July, young people from across the County joined 250,000 others from around the world to take part in the #TGIWeekender festival, breaking the world record for the largest number of people camping at the same time.

The Scouts sleeped somewhere other than their own bed. Ideas included sleeping under the kitchen table, in the garden, on the sofa or even in the bath.

As lockdown eases and young people start to return to school, life is still far from normal in the County and social distancing restrictions will apply for some time to come. Young people will still be unable to experience the excitement of taking part in sleepovers with their friends, going on school trips or going to Scout camp.

Young people are feeling increasingly isolated and this is having a negative impact on their mental wellbeing. In recent YouGov research, commissioned by the Scout Association, 62% of British teenagers aged 14-18, said the Covid19 crisis has had a bad effect on their mental health. This effect is more likely to be felt by girls than boys, with 69% of girls aged 14-18 saying they have felt this negative impact compared to 57% of boys.

This summer thousands of local, national and international Scout camps have been cancelled and the opportunities to learn new skills, meet young people from other communities and learn about new cultures have been lost. #TGIWeekender has been designed to play a small part in filling that gap.









The weekend included the opportunity for young people to take part in celebrity led online sessions and the world's biggest virtual campfire. Speaking about the event Chief Scout Bear Grylls said:

"Life is about supporting each other and this is now more important than ever. The #TGIWeekender is about helping Scouts stay connected with their existing friends and make new ones from across the UK and from around the world. It's an amazing opportunity for young people to reconnect with friends, have fun, and learn skills for life" He added "We are putting on a programme for all ages with a number of online sessions designed for everyone so they can dip into and out of it. We hope that Scouts and non-Scouts will join us in this adventure, feel more connected with each other and learn some new skills."

"This summer I had planned to be part of Eurojam, a camp in Poland. As I can no longer go, I thought it would be really fun to set up a tent in my garden and sleep there. All my friends from my Scout Group are doing it too and we are sharing pictures of our home campsites with each other.

Scouting helps its members develop skills for life, including those required to adapt to new and sometimes difficult situations. The Scouts want to prove that just because they cannot meet 'face to face' right now, they can still come together and learn new skills.

## 5th Beckenham South Scout Group supports living well

The past 20 weeks, have seen the 5th Beckenham South Scout Group offering the use of their Scout hut to collect for Living Well Bromley - a local charity based at Holy Trinity Church, Lennard Road. The charity supports people with varied needs, including social isolation, addiction, mental health issues, homelessness whilst offering debt advice together with a foodbank whilst also supporting Christ Church Anerley food bank.

Adam Young, Group Scout Leader said "We are very privileged to have our own Scout hut and wanted to use it for something worthwhile during the lockdown and of course the current climate of extra need and food shortages. Our thoughts were for the many people who have lost employment, families who normally receive free school meals and essentially those who have never considered needing the assistance of a food bank before. Our local food bank was in dire need for food donations. with supermarkets limiting purchases with empty shelves, they were and still are struggling to provide their normal service, with the increased demand they are experiencing. As with Scouting, the Living Well food bank is run by volunteers and with the need for social distancing, it can only accept donations once a week during a two hour window every Tuesday and this doesn't help their cause. So, our aim was to collect as many donations as we could by providing our Scout hut as a drop off point. We have opened our hut up for the past two Saturdays between 10am and 3pm to give people the opportunity to donate and we then gather it all together on a Tuesday and deliver in bulk.





Our Beaver, Cub, Scout and Explorer Scout families responded with amazing generosity and kindness, many of them taking the opportunity of the fine weather to come out on their bicycles` or have a family walk with a purpose and, as you can see from the photos, the results have been fantastic on both weeks.

We intend to continue every Saturday at least until the donations wane but hopefully both enthusiasm and generosity will continue.

We have run it with just two leaders present to maintain social distancing, myself and Deborah Cavalli, both of us Assistant Explorer Scout Leaders and a couple of our older Explorers Scouts who have assisted with the sorting, packing and loading for delivery."







Eoin Mclaughlin and James Hayes, from the 5th Beckenham South Network Scouts, both aged 18 Said "As soon as we read the emails from our Explorer leaders asking for food bank donations we both volunteered straight away to help out if we were needed. Of course, we must stay two metres apart but that is easy enough with only four people in the Scout hut. All the food donations that come in are sorted into categories - tinned meat, tinned vegetables, pasta, rice, cereals, that sort of thing. At the same time, we check the use by date as anything out of date cannot be distributed by the food bank and then we pack it all up and help load it for delivery. We have never seen anything

like this before in our lifetime and are very worried about people and especially young families who are struggling to get enough food. As Scouts our promise is to help other people and we are really proud to be helping collect food for the food bank. Being in Year 13 we have time on our hands that we wanted to use to help our community and we will continue to help for as long as the current pandemic continues and beyond, since even when the lockdown goes away, we must remember that the needs of vulnerable people will still remain."

and we have done a lot of fun activities from home during the lockdown. Every week, when we would normally be at a meeting, we held a Zoom meeting for our Scouts to attend - normally we would have around 15 Scouts. Each week we would do a couple of guizzes on a website called Kahoot which they all enjoyed. These were on a variety of different topics such as Scouting knowledge, memory, general knowledge, observation and many more. Another favourite activity was the scavenger hunt. They enjoyed racing round the house trying to be the first back with the item we asked them to get so I decided to expand this game. I gave them a list of 16 things to find around Bromley over a week so they could get out and get fresh air. On the next meeting we showed our pictures and I was thrilled to see most Scouts took part and enjoyed themselves. Another activity we ran was 'Escape from Alcatraz' where we set them a week to answer questions and use Google Earth street and satellite view to help them escape the island and finish at Brownsea Island.

However, the best activity we ran was the virtual camp. We delivered a Swedish candle, a fire lighter,



some kindling, juggling balls and a rope to each Scout who wanted to take part. That night we sat outside on Zoom and the Scouts were toasting marshmallows and sausages with their family. It was great to see the parents getting involved and enjoying themselves as well as the Scouts. We had juggling lessons and did some knotting and we slept in our gardens overnight. The next morning, we got up and joined a Zoom meeting and made fried breakfast together before the camp was over. It was a strange experience to say the least, but it was a very rewarding one, as we saw how much everyone was enjoying it.

I became a Scout Section Leader for 7th Sidcup, Bexley just before lockdown after being a Sectional Assistant for nearly 5 years. Like many others I took to Zoom for virtual Scouting. I joined 1st Virtual Scout Facebook group to help get some ideas on how to keep Scouting going. This group inspired me to reach out to other groups in Bexley, Bromley and all up and down the country to deliver a photography session. I had young people from 4th Barnehurst, 1st Foot Cray and 7th Sidcup to name a few local groups, reaching outwards to 7th Walthamstow, across to 10th Torbay Sea Scouts in Devon, up to 16th Lancaster Scouts, 5th Shipley in West Yorkshire and finally reaching 121 Scout Group in Clyde region, Glasgow, with many other groups in between.

As I own a small photography business with my wife Lauren, I decided to put together a virtual photography session that I could share with young people. For me, photography helps to keep my spirits up and I thought it could do the same for young people. Giving them a chance to learn about photography and giving them a safe, enjoyable activity they could do outside whilst distancing. As our business was temporarily closed, this was a perfect time to give a little extra during these difficult times.

When I originally came up with the idea, I created a PowerPoint presentation covering the Scout activity badge requirements. As I started to advertise this session, I got interest from Cub, Scout and Explorer leaders. I tailored the presentation to meet as many requirements as possible. Towards the end, I was even covering the Guides badge requirements too. This allowed all the young people to learn more than was required to earn their badge.

I had multiple groups come together with my busiest session having 120 members. With no written speech for the presentations, each session had its own little spin on it. The young people learned about different camera equipment and accessories, how to use aperture and shutter speed settings, zoom, focus points and flash. To help improve their skills I explained the rule of third and eventually the Golden Triangle technique in later sessions.

Scouting in this way has been a new challenge for us all. I think Leaders and the young people have embraced it very well and I am pleased I know I have managed to help many young people to earn their photography badge during lockdown..

Nine-year-old Charlie Barnes is a Cub Scout at the 1st Crayford Cubs pack who suffers with autism. Becoming a Cub has helped Charlie gain confidence and social skills and, during lockdown, Charlie has been using his creative skills providing lots of artwork.

Whilst enjoying walks in the park with his family he frequently passed the balconies of a retirement home and soon the residents began to wave at him. Charlie had often spoken about isolation and being alone and he felt upset that during lockdown the residents were unable to have family and friends visit them.

Charlie regarded the residents as his friends and after his mum contacted the manager, he began to make posters and Easter cards for each resident – this was the beginning of an amazing friendship. During the following weeks there were frequent conversations with the manager – learning especially that one of the ladies would be celebrating her 100th birthday. Charlie immediately began to plan how he could make this day special for her; he bought banners and balloons for the manager to decorate her room and delivered flowers and a special card. Charlie was so proud to receive a lovely photo of the lady receiving her gifts.

Covid 19 restrictions had prevented Charlie from meeting any of the residents in person but he has been invited to be the guest of honour at a tea party when it is safe to visit.



Charlie says. "I like making cards from craft materials. I make things all the time. I really like waving to the ladies in the garden. It made me happy. I made lots of posters to give to them as Easter presents because they were a bit lonely on their own with no family. I made a birthday

card for Helena she was 100. She liked her flowers. When I walked down the road I always looked in to wave to them if they are in the garden. I'm looking forward to seeing them for a tea party."







Congratulations also go to 5th Chislehurst Scouts who have been busy letter writing during lockdown to the residents of a local care home. That should have put a smile on their faces!
